Dear ceecon guests,

with the DGO Congress of Central and East European Studies, we are realising a long-cherished idea: an international forum for academic exchange on topics related to Eastern Europe held in Germany. This congress creates a space for the discussion of new topics and approaches in research and for interdisciplinary dialogue. Furthermore, ceecon offers young academics a forum for presenting their research projects.

ceecon is an academic congress. But academic work always takes place in a social and political environment that influences research questions and working methods. Russia's war against Ukraine makes this painfully clear. Many of the panels on offer at the congress respond directly to this escalation of violence, raising questions about the way modern autocracies work and the role of historiography, literature, and religion in times of war, as well as the consequences of war for the development of the rule of law in individual states. We also take the opportunity to discuss how the past 30 years of political and social transition have impacted research agendas within the humanities and social sciences. And we ask to what extent scholarly work and international collaboration are even possible under wartime conditions and the growing trend towards authoritarianism. Politics influences academic work, but academic work can also give impulses to society and politics. This is another reason why ceecon is an important forum.

We would like to thank all those who made this congress possible. The organizing committee as well as the members of our seven academic expert groups and the Junge DGO have designed the program together with our partner, the Institute for East European Studies at the Freie Universität Berlin. In the Institute, we have found both a very competent partner and generous host. The Arsenal Cinema and the Ukrainian Film Festival have enabled us to involve the Berlin public in the congress as well. The Federal Ministry of Education and Research and Freie Universität Berlin have also provided support to ceecon from their own funds. Finally, we thank you for accepting our invitation to attend.

ceecon, the DGO-Congress of Central and East European Studies, is the largest multidisciplinary congress on Central and Eastern Europe to be held in the German-speaking countries. It was established in 2022 as a cooperative project between the German Association for East European Studies (Deutsche Gesellschaft für Osteuropakunde, DGO) and the Institute for East European Studies (Osteuropa-Institut, OEI) at the Freie Universität Berlin.



HOMEWARD brings together the two landscapes of the Russian invasion in 2014: the war in the Donbass and the occupied Crimea. Crimean Tatar director Nariman Aliev tells the story of a father who tries to bring the body of his son, a victim of the war in Donbass, from Kyiv to Crimea to be buried according to the rite of the Muslim Crimean Tatars. The arduous journey reveals how the experience of the current war in Ukraine calls up the repressed history of violence against the Crimean Tatars.

- >> With its approximately 360,000 volumes, the library of the Institute for East European Studies provides an excellent resource for research


